What is Lent?

Lent is the 40 days that precede Easter (excluding the Sundays). In the Christian Scriptures, the number 40 relates to the period spent in the ark by Noah, the period spent by Israel seeking the Promised Land after the Exodus, and the amount of time Jesus was in the wilderness after His baptism and prior to the beginning of his ministry. For us, the season of Lent is an invitation to 40 days of renewal ("lent" is a form of the Old English *lencten*, meaning "spring-time") and 40 days to prepare ourselves to take in the Good News of Easter through deeper disciplines of prayer, fasting, and sacrifice.

Lent begins on what is called "Ash Wednesday." Part of the tradition of Ash Wednesday is to receive a mark of ashes on your forehead. Receiving the ashes reminds us that God's love is triumphant over sin and death, and that God remains "in communion" with us, that in Christ, our mortality is overcome.

Another important tradition in Lent is to sacrifice or give up something for the 40 days. For example, some people will give up television, others will give up eating meat, some will give up beer or coffee, others may give up gossiping. This year, as you commit to a sacrifice, I encourage you to also commit to one another in ministry. Add something to your next forty days as we journey together towards the cross, to help build the Kingdom of God where you are now.

Day 2: Thursday, March 3, 2022

"Behold the days are coming," says the Lord, "when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as King and deal wisely..." - Jeremiah 23:5a

Jeremiah, the prophet, is proclaiming the days are coming when Christ will come from the line of David. He will be called a righteous Branch because He will sprout up from the stump of David's fallen dynasty.

Looking on to the next few verses, Jeremiah says, "a King will reign wisely and do what is just and right in the land. In His days, Judah will be saved and Israel will live in safety. This is the name by which he will be called: The Lord Our Righteousness" (Jeremiah 5b-6).

Jeremiah was called by God to urge the people of Judah to return to God, as they had turned their backs on Him. Jeremiah didn't bring good news to the people; he brought a message of doom and gloom.

If Jeremiah were to come back today, would we be willing to listen to his words, or would we decide to turn him off because we don't want someone telling us what we shouldn't be doing?

May we all ask God to let us know what we need to do to follow Christ more closely.

Day 3: Friday, March 4, 2022

"I have been crucified with Christ; and it is no longer I who live, but it is Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me." - Galatians 2:19-20

I was born and raised in East Texas. Pine trees and pickup trucks, farmland and football, oil fields and old cowboys. It was a fine place to grow up. I was shaped by that place and those people. I'm thankful for what I received. It wasn't perfect, but what place is? My experiences in East Texas imparted to me an understanding of myself, the people I belonged to, and a way of being in the world, or outlook on life.

But as I grew older and lived other places, I learned that everyone is not the same. As part of First Killeen, I taught a Sunday School class where I was the only person native to Texas.

In Paul's letter to the Galatians, we learn of another group of people who experienced different worlds coming together. The Christian fellowships in Galatia were composed of Jews and Gentiles, religiously and ethnically Jewish Christbelievers, and Gentiles–people of different ethnic backgrounds–who received Jesus as Lord. This raised questions: who belongs in the fellowship? Should Gentiles be circumcised? Should they observe kosher laws, like the Jews? Can we eat together?

How does Paul answer? Gentiles do not need to be circumcised. They don't have to keep kosher. Jews and Gentiles can share table fellowship. What brings a person into Christian community is faith. We belong to God and to one another through our common trust in Jesus. Paul tells us that when we trust in Christ we die to our old self and old ways. We die to our old communities. We're welcomed into the church. Jesus gives us a new identity, makes us part of a new people, and invites us to live a new way.

<u>Prayer</u>

Heavenly Father, I love where I'm from. But I'm more thankful for where I live now, as a citizen in God's kingdom, as a beloved child of God, as one in whom Christ dwells and delights. Amen.

Day 4: Saturday, March 5, 2022

"If God doesn't build the house, the builders only build shacks. If God doesn't guard the city, the night watchman might as well nap. It's useless to rise early and go to bed late, and work your worried fingers to the bone. Don't you know he enjoys giving rest to those he loves?" - Psalm 127:1-2

This passage originally meant to me: mitigate your anxiety by trusting God. You know, turn it over to God and get some rest. Twenty years later in my life, I thought that what this passage really meant was be sure and integrate God into your activities. To do otherwise is to invite failure.

To give a little context about my current life situation, I am nearing the big 70. Throughout these years of mine, I have failed repeatedly to consider the Will of the Lord. I have sought forgiveness and repented as necessary, and it has required doing that more than once. I tell you all this to explain that I understand how hard it is to do what I am about to suggest.

So, upon the occasion of composing this devotional, I have discerned a more succinct refinement to these verses. I believe this passage suggests that you fully submit yourself to the will of the Lord.

Submission means two things to me:

1. Get your thinking straight: on all your prayers (what do I seek), on all of your plans (is God's Will considered), on all of your activities (am I living as an example reflecting a loving Christ).

2. And, then, take serious time to actively listen, frequently, for God's guidance. Implement His guidance, as best you can, doing the parts you can do, and leaving the rest to Him.

Heavenly Father, I submit my will to You. I forsake my agenda and my plans for Yours. Please help me to discern and implement Your will for me. Amen.

Day 9: Thursday, March 10, 2022

Just saying "I'm sorry" is hard. Those two little words always want to bring along a friend. "I'm sorry, but" is the most common and often the most damaging. We are afraid of the ramifications of our wrongdoing and seek to dampen our own guilt.

In Psalm 6, David is calling out to God to forgive him for his sins, but he is able to do so with complete faith that he will be forgiven. We struggle to understand why something happened to us, or more importantly, why we may have done something to someone else. Yet, if we just change one simple word, our apology can carry away the full weight of our guilt.

Instead of saying, "I'm sorry, but" we should say, "I'm sorry because of your steadfast love and forgiveness." We should always remember God's love and be willing and able to unburden ourselves to him.

Day 10: Friday, March 11, 2022

2021 has tested me mentally, physically, emotionally and spiritually. We began the year with our house flooding and then losing power and water for nearly a week due to the ice storm that impacted so much of Texas. As I returned to work, we struggled with stable childcare, changing facilities three times in six months. We struggled with health issues—our youngest had constant ear infections after starting daycare as well as RSV, pneumonia, and hand foot mouth disease. We lived in fear of Covid-19 and had to quarantine four times throughout the year from possible exposure. I experienced two miscarriages, only to find out we were expecting again when Covid-19 actually found us, followed abruptly by a broken leg. We struggled financially, and our family was pushed to a breaking point.

Everyone says He never gives you more than you can handle, but I worried constantly, my faith faltered, and I questioned why us? I knew our story was not unique; so many families in our community, our country, and across the globe continue to have similar struggles as the pandemic drags on. I can't say how or when it happened, but eventually He touched my heart and reminded me of my church family. The moment I made a prayer request things began to get better. I was able to feel the sense of calm again knowing that He had us and would continue to carry us through these trying times. I began to take life one day at a time and stopped worrying as much about tomorrow. I don't know what the message or lesson He had for us in all of this, if any, but I do know that HE is in control and has the most beautiful plan for ALL of us.

Glenn Morrison has been exceptionally active with Killeen citizens who have cooked Saturday breakfast once a month. During the pandemic, he coordinated the delivery of sack lunches to the needy.

Lunch with Neighbors is more than food; twice a year we give out health kits. Gideon bibles are available along with Upper Room devotionals. Betty Meadows also knitted 100 hats and scarves and 80 mittens to pass out for cold weather. She handed them out at Neighbors, the Food Bank, and Soup Kitchen.

We must recognize a "healthy" handful of people who are there every Thursday to serve and clean up after each meal. Their love, full commitment, and unselfish contributions have been exceptional. We love you, folks! Lunch with Neighbors is not a requirement. It's part of First United Methodist Church and it's just what we do! God bless all of you!

My sister also claims with certainty that the voices and people who wrote the letter were God's angels ministering to her and her husband.

Over the years, my sister has counseled and prayed with many clients at Salvation Army, baked and cooked countless goodies for friends and family who suffer from health problems, and used her beautiful voice to sing praises to God.

Day 35: Tuesday, April 5, 2022


He says, "Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth." - Psalm 46:10

Jesus still makes a place at the table for us as well. Judas didn't know the whole story as we do. Judas didn't have faith that Jesus was the Messiah. He did not have the loyalty, fidelity, and trust in Jesus. Let our story not end in betrayal of The One who gave His life for us.

Words Worth Praying

Read Psalm 22

Sometimes we feel stuck. We are overwhelmed with feelings or circumstances. We aren't sure what lies ahead. The Psalms are my go-to when I'm not sure how to pray. The words seem to echo the range of feelings that I experience. Some are celebration and high praise to God, "for great is his steadfast love toward us, and the faithfulness of the Lord endures forever" (Ps 117). We also find cries of a broken heart, vulnerable prayers for help, and laments, "I have come into deep waters, and the flood sweeps over me. I am weary with my crying" (Ps 69).

Jesus knew these scriptures and surely prayed them throughout his life. You probably recognize the first verse of Psalm 22 as words that Jesus cries from the cross: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Reading through the rest of the verses, there are many things that Jesus endured in his trial and crucifixion--scorn, mocking, encircled by "bulls," poured out like water, bones out of joint, thirst, clothing divided by casting lots, and the agony of suffering. Psalm 22 does not end here, just as Good Friday and Holy Saturday are not the end of the story.

The cross is both torture and triumph, darkness and deliverance. In the dust of death, Jesus is defeating evil, restoring life. Psalm 22 ends with prophetic promise in verses 23-31, pointing to the eternal victory that Jesus has won. "Posterity will serve him; future generations will be told about the Lord, and proclaim his deliverance to a people yet unborn, saying that he has done it." He has done it!

<u>Prayer</u>

May the Psalms both teach us and lead us, giving words to our prayers and life to our souls. Thank you for the unimaginable gift of life you have given to us, Jesus. Amen.
